SB-85.01

“Special Constitutional Referendum”

(Referendum for establishing a new constitution for the ASOSU Student Government)

WHEREAS On February 28, 2025, OSU Vice President of Student Affairs Dan Larson sent an email directive to the ASOSU Student Government, cosigned by the then- President of the ASOSU, which states, “Effective immediately, and to safeguard the well-being of all student leaders and ensure ASOSU can fulfill its mission as the recognized OSU Corvallis campus student government, certain functions of the ASOSU organization and its student-employees will be paused, and its student employees and officers will be directed to undertake a comprehensive programmatic review”;

WHEREAS Moreover, the directive states, “During this period, [ASOSU Senate meetings and committee meetings, ASOSU Judicial Council meetings and hearings, ASOSU Student Fee Committee meetings, and all activities of Independent Committees of the Executive Branch] will be paused and will not take place.”

WHEREAS The “comprehensive programmatic review” established by the directive has served as a condition for the restoration of paused operations of the ASOSU. While originally scheduled to conclude on May 2, 2025, on that date, the Vice President of Student Affairs issued a follow-up “Extension of Deadline for Process Completion,” which adds, “Once newly elected leaders have completed the hiring process and participated in training requirements to serve in their position, I will seek input from the ASOSU Advisors and elected leaders on how much additional time will be needed. During this period, ASOSU activity will remain paused, consistent with my communication from February 28, 2025”;

WHEREAS Included within the requirements set forth in the review has been the stipulation that the ASOSU Student Government amend its Constitution and other governing documents, using recommendations from a consultant contracted by the Division of Student Affairs, to also be informed by a separate contracted review of internal employment practices by Stoel Rives LLP, and addressing any issues raised in communications from the Division of Student Affairs;

WHEREAS Following requests from the ASOSU Executive Leadership (and the ASOSU Student Government broadly) for revision to preserve various preexisting constitutional provisions, the Student Affairs-contracted consultant issued a final draft Constitution with some of these requests reflected on August 6, 2025;

WHEREAS It has remained a priority of the 2025-26 ASOSU Executive Leadership to ensure the soonest possible restoration of full operations of the elected Student Senate and independent Judicial Council, to function coequally alongside the executive branch; as well as to permit the timely process for the annual allocation mandatory incidental fees under ORS 352.105. To this goal, the Executive Leadership has met with Student Affairs leadership in an attempt to reach agreement upon terms for ending this period of suspended operations.

WHEREAS At the request of the Vice President of Student Affairs, the ASOSU Vice President submitted a proposal ¹ on August 5, 2025, and subsequent revisions on August 8, 2025, to conditionally permit the 85th Student Senate to convene its first three meetings, for the purposes of (1) deliberating rules and guidelines of decorum and procedure; (2) reviewing any legislation for constitutional amendments, to ensure the due process of referral to voters is completed; and (3) voting upon any pending executive or judicial confirmations;

WHEREAS On August 8, 2025, following receipt of the revised version, the Vice President of Student Affairs authorized the ASOSU Vice President's official proposal and permitted the Senate to convene for the provided purposes;

WHEREAS Prior administrative draft plans for the conclusion of the review provided an alternative approval process for constitutional amendments, which did not include a Senate vote or student referendum. In the interest of maintaining adherence to preexisting constitutional standards, including the Oath of Office, the ASOSU Executive Leadership believes that the introduction of the consultant-drafted Constitution via this legislation is in the best interest of preserving these commitments;

WHEREAS The ASOSU Vice President has taken care to ensure that their proposal does not limit the Senate's rights or privileges with regard to the review, revision, or free and fair voting upon the proposal contents. The ASOSU Executive Leadership welcomes and strongly encourages rigorous and careful Senate review;

WHEREAS The ASOSU Executive Leadership, despite its prior and continuing concerns, believes and advises the Senate that the completion of the ASOSU Vice President's proposal, alongside the completion of preexisting review work groups, will be the most feasible and compliant short-term option to end the ongoing review;

Be it hereby enacted by the ASOSU Senate:

I. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Upon passage, the Constitution of the ASOSU Student Government shall be amended to read as intended below, pending approval of the student body as a ballot measure in a special election held within 90 days of passage, in accordance with all applicable constitutional requirements.

The approval of this constitution, and succession from the former iteration, shall be enacted as stipulated in the amended constitution, if successful.

The date of the election, window of voting, and all other applicable conditions of the special election not otherwise stated herein or in existing statute, shall be the determination of the ASOSU Elections Committee Chair. The ASOSU Elections Committee may amend these terms established by the Elections Committee Chair, if necessary, at any time prior to the official release of the election ballot.

The ASOSU Elections Committee Chair shall convene an Elections Committee and publish the date of the election and window of voting within 21 days of passage of this bill, with at least 48 hours advance notice provided to the Elections Committee.

Constitution (*effective adoption date, 2025*) of the **Associated Students of Oregon State University**

Preamble

We, the Associated Students of Oregon State University (ASOSU), in order to promote academic excellence, encourage the development of the student body, and support the varied interests of students as members of the academic community through democratic representation, hereby establish an association and adopt this Constitution.

Definitions

- A. “**Appointments Committee (AC)**” fills vacancies arising in the Senate or in any other vacant positions for which another appointment process is not established by ASOSU.
- B. “**ASOSU Student Body**,” or simply “**student body**,” is the collective of at-large members of the ASOSU (Corvallis) enrolled in at least one eligible credit hour by the time of the election (or by a time that data is pulled for reference up to two weeks prior) according to the Registrar.
- C. “**ASOSU Student Government**,” or “**ASOSU**,” refers to the totality of the organization, which includes its branches, structures, and entities.
- D. “**Constituency**” is a set of students grouped together distinctly from, but included within, the entirety of the student body.
- E. “**Election Committee (EC)**” facilitates the regular ASOSU election.
- F. “**Non-Presidential Bodies**” are advisory or consultative in character and reside within the Executive Branch.

- G. “**Executive Branch (EB)**” is the executive branch of the ASOSU.
- H. “**Non-Presidential Offices**” serve as support staff and may not exercise binding authority, except as part of the Elections Committee.
- I. “**Executive Services**” are established by statute with a defined purpose and are provided resources and staff.
- J. “**Judicial Council (JC)**” is the judicial branch of the ASOSU.
- K. “**Officer of the ASOSU Student Government**” refers to any person who is a member of the student body elected, appointed, or succeeding to an ASOSU office.
- L. “**Statutes**” are all legislative acts passed by the ASOSU Senate and enacted pursuant to this Constitution.

Article I: Name

- A. This student governance organization is to be known as the ASOSU Student Government (ASOSU). The ASOSU is the sole recognized students’ association of Oregon State University (Corvallis).

Article II: Purpose

- A. The ASOSU Student Government serves to provide a means of representation for the student body, including, but not limited to, in the matters delegated to the ASOSU by applicable law and university policy. The ASOSU is foundationally committed to the mission of democratically representative governance for the students of Oregon State University.

Article III: Membership and Representation

- A. All Oregon State University (OSU) students enrolled in at least one Corvallis-based course, as defined by the university, are members of the student body.
 - 1. Students who are enrolled in the immediate upcoming academic term, or who remain continuously eligible for enrollment following the conclusion of a prior term, shall retain membership during academic breaks, including the summer session. Students not currently enrolled or registered for the upcoming term are not members of the student body
- B. The ASOSU shall not discriminate on the basis of age, color, disability, gender identity or expression, genetic information, marital status, national origin, race, religion, sex, sexual orientation, or veteran status in any of its policies, procedures or practices

Article IV: The Senate

A. Purpose

- 1. The Senate is to legislate on behalf of the student body in matters affecting students and define official Student Government policies, positions, and stances.
- 2. The Senate initiates legislation and programs as it deems necessary to carry out its responsibilities. These include but are not limited to:
 - i. Promotion of the personal development, academic success, and civic engagement of the student body;

- ii. Services or resolutions to support students, improve campus life, and foster community partnerships;
- iii. Requests for the collection of incidental fees;
- iv. Requirements for the conduct of persons holding office in the ASOSU;
- v. Public statements and issue positions on behalf of the ASOSU.
- vi. Oversight and control of ASOSU fiscal matters, including the approval of budgets and expenditures for the ASOSU Student Government.
- vii. Fiscal authority as aligned with Oregon Revised Statute 352.105, which identifies the recognized student government role in the allocation of mandatory incidental fees at public universities in Oregon.

B. Composition

1. The Senate is composed of 12-35 members.
2. Senate elections are held annually.
3. The Senate will establish by statute the number of Senate seats and the scope of constituencies, or lack thereof; and (3) the number of seats to be elected for collection of mandatory incidental fees.
 - i. No change to the amount, constituency basis, or delegation for collection of mandatory incidental fees, of Senate seats shall be passed except prior to the election of the Senate for which it is intended to take effect.
4. The Senate may include at-large members or members that hold constituency-based seats, or both.
 - i. Constituency-based seats may represent a constituency on the basis of undergraduate, graduate, or other student classifications, major or minor, academic college, affiliation with a campus partner or organization, or any combination of these or other qualifications.
 - ii. Constituency-based seats may only be established if each student that is in the student body will be represented by at least one constituency-based seat.
 - iii. Prior to the establishment of constituency-based seats the Judicial Council (JC) will review the constituencies to determine whether significantly disproportionate representation of one population of students over another is likely to exist. If so, the JC will notify the Senate and President, and constituencies must be appropriately adjusted and reviewed by the JC.
 - Significantly disproportionate representation occurs when the best available estimate at the time of review suggests that the ratio of constituency-based seats to the number of students in the constituency group is more than double the ratio of constituency-based seats to the number of students in any other constituency group.
 - Representation for these purposes will be determined by the number of persons to which the constituency applies, irrespective of whether they vote in the student body elections.
 - If there are standing constituency-based seats established in statute, the review and adjustment of any constituency-based seats must occur annually

C. Terms

1. Each Senate seat holds a one-year term.

D. Presiding Officers

1. The Vice President serves as the President of the Senate, who only votes in the event of a Senate tie.
2. The Senate will choose one of its members to serve as the President pro tempore who presides in the absence of the Vice President by majority vote of the quorum present.
3. The Senate may establish other officers to assist in its affairs.

E. Rules of Procedure

1. All legislation passed by the Senate, except those pertaining to its own rules of procedure, will be presented to the President. The President may sign or veto this legislation within seven days of receipt from the Senate.
 - i. In the absence of a signature, or the absence of a veto, from the President within seven days of receiving legislation, legislation shall automatically go into effect.
 - ii. Presidential vetoes may be overruled by a two-thirds vote of the Senate.
2. The quorum is a simple majority of the Senate membership.
3. All meetings of the Senate will be public, except as provided by state law.
4. The Senate will keep records of its proceedings, including recorded votes, minutes, and agendas.
5. The Senate will be in session, at a minimum, during the fall, winter, and spring academic terms.
6. The Senate will establish rules of order and procedures that ensure the management of discussion, debate, and other procedures to limit meetings to a reasonable amount of time.

F. Confirmations

1. The Senate confirms the following nominations through a fair, equitable and unbiased process by majority vote of quorum present:
 - i. The appointed staff of the President;
 - ii. Members of the JC;
 - iii. Persons appointed to a non-presidential executive office through the processes established for that office in statute.
 - iv. Appointments to Senate vacancies.
2. Confirmations will be conducted in a manner consistent with OSU hiring practices, including applicable law and university policies and procedures. The confirmation process shall not question nominees or discriminate based on protected class, political association, or a candidate's right to assemble.

G. Disciplinary Proceedings and Termination of Office

1. The Senate is responsible for initiating disciplinary proceedings against ASOSU officers for serious violations of the Constitution, duties and obligations enacted under this Constitution, applicable law, or university policy.

- i. The Senate may initiate disciplinary proceedings with a simple majority of present Senators.
 - ii. Following the initiation of disciplinary proceedings, the Senate will provide notice of the concern and opportunity to respond to any officer against whom such disciplinary process is initiated. The Senate may also invite the testimony of other relevant parties or witnesses. Such disciplinary hearings shall be conducted in executive sessions unless the person subject to the disciplinary process requests an open hearing. In that event, the hearing must be held in an open public meeting. The Senate may remove an officer with a two-thirds vote of Senate members.
 - iii. The chair of the JC, or a judicial councilor appointed by the Chair, presides over this vote.
2. No persons will be permitted to preside over their own disciplinary proceedings.

Article V: The Executive Branch

A. Purpose

1. The Executive Branch serves primarily to provide staffing and implementation for the execution of the programs and initiatives of the ASOSU Student Government.

B. Composition

1. The Executive Branch (EB) is led by the President and Vice President. The executive authority of the ASOSU is vested in the President.
 - i. The President is responsible for conducting the principal administrative affairs of the ASOSU. The functions accorded to the President include but are not limited to:
 1. Represent the ASOSU to increase the visibility and influence of student needs and interests;
 2. Approval or veto of Senate legislation;
 3. Management of the ASOSU budget, except for such portions as expressly delegated to the Senate, Judicial Council (JC), Elections Committee (EC), or Appointments Committee (AC);
 4. Maintenance of staff, task forces, committees, or other structures of the EB;
 5. Leadership of, and capacity to direct, the staff accountable to the ASOSU President (including appointment or conclusion of their position within ASOSU);
 6. Establish policies or procedures applicable to the administration of the EB;
 7. Appoint staff and members of the JC, subject to Senate confirmation;
 8. Deliver an annual address to the Senate on the State of the Students.
 - ii. The functions accorded to the Vice President include but are not limited to:

1. Represent the ASOSU to increase the visibility and influence of student needs and interests;
 2. Preside over the ASOSU Senate as the President of the Senate;
 3. Succession to the office of the President in the case of a vacancy;
 4. Management of spending of ASOSU budget delegated to the Vice President;
 5. Provide oversight and assistance to the executive committees, task forces, services, and staff of the EB;
 6. Leadership of staff as defined by the President.
2. Within the Executive Branch, the ASOSU Senate may, by statute, establish bodies, offices, or services that operate with defined functional independence from the direct supervision of the President, when such independence is necessary to ensure impartiality, accountability, or continuity of ASOSU operations.
 - i. These entities shall remain part of the Executive Branch and subject to applicable oversight and reporting requirements established by statute, but shall not be directed in their daily operations by either the President or the Senate. The statute creating such an entity must clearly specify its purpose, reporting obligations, and the scope of its independence.

C. Term

1. The President and Vice President hold a one-year term.

D. Succession

1. If the Presidency is vacated, the Vice President succeeds to the office of President.
2. If the Vice Presidency is vacated, the President will, with the advice and consent of the Senate, appoint a member of the ASOSU to succeed to the office by majority vote of the quorum present.
3. If both the Presidency and Vice Presidency are vacated, the President pro tempore of the Senate shall succeed to the office of President and, with the advice and consent of the Senate by majority vote of the quorum present, appoints a member of the ASOSU to succeed to the Vice Presidency.

Article VI: The Judicial Council

A. Purpose

1. Ambiguities concerning the interpretation of applicable rules and procedures under the purview of the ASOSU are resolvable by the Judicial Council (JC).
 - i. The JC is the final authority on questions of interpretation of the ASOSU Constitution and Statutes.
2. The JC may consider any case brought before it by any member of the student body pertaining to any parties or institutions, or the actions thereof, under the jurisdiction of this Constitution.

- i. The JC will notify both the filer(s) and the student body of the acceptance or rejection of any case brought before them within two weeks of receipt of the case. In the case of a rejection, the JC will also provide a justification for the rejection.
 - ii. The JC may provide a decision on the interpretation of the Constitution or other acts of the ASOSU upon request by a member of the student body. The JC may decide whether or not to accept such cases on the basis of relevance.
3. The JC may conduct a non-binding sua sponte review of the Constitutionality of any legislation following passage by the Senate. The Senate may compel the JC by motion on a majority vote to provide review but may not limit the review.
 - i. As part of this review, the JC may provide a nonbinding advisory opinion to the President prior to signature or veto, on any areas of judicial interest.
 - ii. In cases where a legislative act presents a clear violation of the Constitution, the JC may rule against the constitutionality of such acts of the Senate. This review must occur within two weeks following the legislation's passage by the Senate and requires a two-thirds vote of the JC membership.

B. Composition

1. The JC will consist of at least five members.
2. JC members are appointed by the President and approved by the Senate by majority vote of the quorum present.
3. In addition to the five regular members, the following individuals may serve a one-term appointment on the Judicial Council, provided they express interest and are confirmed by the Senate. This eligibility requirement shall apply beginning with the adoption of the new constitution:
 - i. Any eligible student who has previously served for at least one year (or the majority of a year) as the ASOSU President or Vice President.
 - ii. Any eligible student who has previously served for at least two years (or the majority of those years) in any elected ASOSU Student Government position, including those appointed to fill a vacancy.

C. Term

1. Members of the JC serve two-year terms.

D. Rules of Procedure

1. The JC will choose its officers, including a Chair, from within its membership by majority vote.
2. The JC is responsible for implementing the JC policies and modifying these policies to meet current needs.
3. The JC Rules of Procedure, or Judicial Council policies, may not grant powers to the JC, or any other branch, that are not otherwise granted by this Constitution.

E. Presiding Officers

1. The Chair is the presiding officer of the JC.

Article VII: The Elections Committee

A. Purpose

1. It is the duty of the Elections Committee (EC) to:
 - i. Set election dates, filing deadlines, and the inauguration date;
 - ii. Propose election rules to the Senate for passage as statutes; and publicize these rules to the student body;
 - iii. Arrange and facilitate the election process;
 - iv. Provide opportunities for the candidates to express their views to the ASOSU.

B. Composition

1. The Elections Committee (EC) may consist of officers of the ASOSU, as well as at-large members of the student body.
2. No member of the EC can run for an elected office while serving on the EC.
3. The Vice President shall chair the Elections Committee but may choose to recuse themselves from this role.
 - i. In the case of actual or potential conflicts of interest, the Vice President shall instead request that the JC Chair, or another member of the JC if the JC Chair is similarly conflicted, appoint committee members.

C. Rules of Procedure

1. The committee shall choose a Chair and any other officers from among its membership.

D. Timelines

1. An EC is to be established no later than Friday of Week 6 of Fall term.
2. The election procedures will be printed by the first day a candidate may file for election.
3. The members of the Senate who are not filing for candidacy in the immediate General Election (if able to meet quorum as defined in Article IV) may make changes in election procedures and regulations up to one week prior to publishing the election procedures and regulations.
 - i. Any member of the Senate filing for candidacy for any ASOSU position in the immediate General Election must abstain from any vote regarding election procedures and regulations.
 - ii. The Senate shall not make changes after publishing the election procedures and regulations without the consent of every candidate.

E. Elections Procedures

1. The Chair of the (EC), if a member of the Senate, may optionally take a temporary leave of absence from their seat to dedicate additional time to overseeing the elections process. A standing proxy, appointed by that senator and eligible to hold office in ASOSU, may also fulfill the duties of the senator in their absence from the Senate.
2. Ten percent of the student body must vote to certify an election.

- i. In the case that the election does not meet ten percent of the student body, the voting period will be extended by two weeks to meet the voting threshold; should voter turnout not meet ten percent after the extension, the election will be certified with the current voter percentage of the student body

Article VII: The Appointments Committee

A. Purpose

1. The Appointments Committee (AC) fills vacancies arising in the Senate, or in any other vacant positions established for ASOSU for which another appointment process is not established.

B. Membership

1. The President, Vice President, President pro tempore of the Senate, and JC Chair comprise the membership of the AC.

C. Presiding Officer

1. The JC Chair is to chair meetings unless absent, in which case the remaining members may choose a temporary chair among themselves.

Article IX: Holding Office

A. Officer Eligibility

1. All candidates for elected, appointed, or succeeded ASOSU offices must illustrate and maintain all of the following:
 - i. Enrollment in at least one Corvallis Campus credit hour;
 - ii. Previous enrollment in at least one prior OSU or college-level credit, or be enrolled in their first term at Oregon State University;
 - iii. Good academic standing with OSU, including maintaining a cumulative 2.0 GPA;
 - iv. Student conduct standing that is not deferred suspension, suspension, or expulsion.
2. Failure to satisfy the credit hours, enrollment, or standing requirements as of the end of any term shall render one ineligible to complete their term of office;
3. All student employment by the university is subject to university requirements. This includes but is not limited to:
 - i. Compliance with university training requirements;
 - ii. Conduct policies;
 - iii. All applicable laws, the ASOSU employment requirements, Board of Trustee policies, OSU standards and policies, OSU's Code of Ethics, and all other OSU policies and rules.

B. The Oath of Office

1. All officers of the ASOSU shall have signed in writing, or verbally sworn or affirmed their accordance with, the oath of office prior to exercising the duties of their respective offices, recited as follows:
 - i. I (full name)... enter into this solemn oath (or affirmation) as (position)... of the Associated Students of Oregon State University... with the pledge to be constantly faithful... to the obligation I now accept.
 - ii. I swear (or affirm) to uphold and execute... to the best of my abilities... the provisions of the Constitution and such acts... as may be passed according to those provisions.
 - iii. These things I solemnly affirm... and stand ready to be challenged... should I fail in my obligation.

C. Separation of Powers

1. No person will concurrently:
 - i. Serve in more than one elected or succeeded ASOSU office within one branch;
 - ii. Exercise the binding powers of offices within two or more of the three equal branches of government:
 1. Service of the EC and AC is an exception.

Article X: Amendments

A. Amendments

1. Amendments to the Constitution may be initiated by a signed petition of no less than five percent of the members of the student body or by a bill passed by a two - thirds vote of the Senate membership.
2. Any constitutional amendment must be referred to the student body by ballot and be voted on by no less than ten percent of the members of the student body.
 - i. Should a majority of those submitting a ballot abstain from voting on the amendment, the amendment fails.
 - ii. A simple majority of those voting is required for passage of the amendment.

B. Legislative & Financial Referendums

1. The Senate, acting on a petition signed by no less than ten percent of the members of the Student Body, may refer any proposed legislation to the student body for a vote. A simple majority of those voting is required for passage of the legislation.
2. Any referendum proposed to change the process for or amount of the student incidental fee shall be required to take place during the fall, winter, or spring terms of the academic year to ensure eligible voters are proportionate to and representative of the students impacted by the vote.

C. Legislative Initiatives

1. Any student body member may petition for initiative measures. All proposed petitions must be submitted to the JC prior to circulation for signatures. The JC will

ensure that the petition is in correct form, and ensure that clarity, consistency, and full disclosure is maintained throughout the entire initiative process. The JC must take action, once the petition has been submitted, within five days, excluding Week 10 and breaks between terms.

2. A petition must be signed by at least five percent of the student body and presented to the President to verify signatures. Within three weeks following the verification of signatures, the President and EC will authorize a special election concerning the petition.
 - i. A simple majority of those voting is required for passage of the initiative.
3. A petition will be declared null and void by the President and therefore not subjected to a special election if:
 - i. The petition was not submitted to the JC prior to the collection of signatures.
 - ii. The petition was not signed by at least five percent of the student body.

D. Financial Initiatives and Referenda

1. The process for Financial Initiatives and Financial Referendum shall be defined in the Statutes of the ASOSU Student Government.

E. Recall

1. The elected officials of the ASOSU are not subject to recall for six weeks following their election. After that time, recall of any elected official of the ASOSU may be initiated.
2. Recalls may be initiated by a signed petition of no less than ten percent of the members of the student body or by a bill passed by a two-thirds vote of the Senate membership.
 - i. The recall petition will be reviewed by the JC to ensure clarity and full disclosure.
3. After proper initiation of recall, the EC will call a special election within three weeks.
 - i. A simple majority of those voting is required for passage of the recall.

Article XI: Enactment

A. Definitions for this article

1. "Regular election" refers to the annual election held by the ASOSU.
 2. "Act" means any statute, rule, binding resolution or bill, or otherwise binding act of the Senate.
 3. "Ratification" is the process of proposed changes to the Constitution by the voting members of the student body.
 4. "Enactment" indicates when the change goes into effect.
 5. "Continuing effect" refers to any effect or action by the Senate that is fulfilled on an ongoing basis or is yet to be completed.
- i. Approved fee recommendations are not in continuing effect, having already been duly requested and/or assessed.

ii. Contracts, agreements of a contractual nature, fiduciary debts, and memorandums of understanding are excluded from this definition.

B. Date of Enactment:

1. The provisions of this Constitution will take effect immediately following ratification in a student body election. The occupants of all offices existing under prior versions of this Constitution will continue to hold the same offices under this constitution for the remaining duration of the terms of office.
2. Any statutes or acts in effect under the prior Constitution will remain in effect, unless or until repealed or amended by the ASOSU Student Government.
3. In the Case of any statute or acts that conflict with this Constitution, the requirements of this Constitution shall take precedence over the former, but all non-conflicting provisions will otherwise remain in effect, unless or until repealed or amended by the ASOSU Student Government.

C. Succession

1. This Constitution supersedes all prior iterations of the ASOSU Constitution. This article shall have no continuing effects beyond the period of transition to which it applies (it is advisable that this article be retained separately for records purposes)

SB-85.09

“ASOSU Incidental Fee Allocation Bill”

(Bill to allocate a portion of the mandatory incidental fee to fund the Associated Students of Oregon State University)

This bill approves a total fee level of \$48.52 per student per term in Fall 2026, Winter 2027, and Spring 2027 to fund the Associated Students of Oregon State University.

- WHEREAS** Oregon law requires that “the board of each public university listed in ORS 352.002...collect mandatory incidental fees upon the request of the recognized student government...” and;
- WHEREAS** At Oregon State University, the Student Fee Committee (SFC) is tasked with review and consideration of the budgets of each university unit or department funded by the mandatory incidental fee, and to make a recommendation regarding said fee to the ASOSU Senate, and;
- WHEREAS** The ASOSU Senate is tasked with review and approval of the SFC’s recommendation of the mandatory incidental fee and;
- WHEREAS** The SFC concluded its deliberations and approved a final recommendation at a public meeting on Saturday, January 10, 2026, and;
- WHEREAS** Title IV § 5.E states that “Bills representing the recommendations of the SFC for each unit (“fee bills”) shall be introduced to the Senate” and;
- WHEREAS** The Associated Students of Oregon State University is one of the university units or departments funded by the mandatory incidental fee, and;
- WHEREAS** The SFC is recommending a total fee level of \$49.22 be charged per student per term in Fall 2026, Winter 2027, and Spring 2027 to fund the Associated Students of Oregon State University;

BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE ASOSU THAT:

A fee of \$48.52 be charged per student per term in Fall 2026, Winter 2027, and Spring 2027 to fund the Associated Students of Oregon State University, including:

- \$48.52 to fund the operating budget for the purposes provided in the budget template herein.
